Mont St Michel

Le Mont Saint Michel is a fantastic medieval abbey and town built on top of a granite island. It is located the north coast of France, and forms the regional border between Normandy and Brittany. dy and Brittany. dy and town Saint Michel is a of the ocean better than the other rocks around them. The mount has a circumference of about 960 meters and it is 92 metres above sea level at its highest point. The

In prehistoric times the Mont was on dry land. It is now a rocky tidal island. Sea levels rose and erosion changed the landscape of the coast. Several layers of layers of rock resisted the wear and tear

of the ocean better than the other rocks around them. The mount has a circumference of about 960 meters and it is 92 metres above sea level at its highest point. The tides can be very different. The difference between the high and low water marks is about 14 metres Medieval pilgrims who crossed the flat land sometimes called the mount "St. Michael in peril of the sea". Today, it can still be dangerous for visitors who do not use the causeway and attempt to walk across the sands from the opposite coast.

Polderisation and occasional flooding have created salt marsh meadows. They are ideal for sheep. The meat that comes from the diet of the sheep has a good flavour.

A bit about....Alençon...and Tenbury



Alençon is an important town in the Orne department, towards the south of the Normandy region and north of Le Mans. An important town in the 10th-11th centuries, Alencon is best known as an important centre for lace production, and although the industry is not very active nowadays the story is recounted in the town's Museum of Fine Arts and Lacemaking.

In the attractive centre of the town you will discover a historic section with some interesting half-timbered and ornate

stone buildings lining the streets, and numerous small architectural highlights: it is very enjoyable to explore, with part of the historic centre also pedestrianised. The part of the town on the Sarthe river is also attractive, and Alençon has a good selection of cafes and restaurants.
