


La Véloscenié

La Véloscenié is a long distance 280 miles cycleway from Paris to Le Mont St Michel which passes by La Ferté Macé, Bagnoles de L'Orne and Domfront . It is generally flat and friendly with just a series of gentle inclines between Alençon and Carrouges. There is plenty to see and do on the route: Orchards near Domfront, the Musée de Poire where you will find such delights as perry cider and Calvados.

Maybe you can persuade your hosts to try out the route (well, just a bit of it) when you join us on our visit to La Ferté Macé next Spring.


