- Valid for at least 3 months after the day you plan to leave (check the 'expiry date') When it mentions 'leave' it means leave France which will be 28th May 2025 (I.e. your passport must be valid to at least the 28th August).


Members and friends on the Bristol trip were asked to 'have their say' on their preferences for an Autumn 2025 visit by choosing from:

Falaise

The Calvados town of 7744 inhabitants was the birthplace of William I the Conqueror, first of the Norman Kings of Englad. The Château de Falaise (12th-13th century), which overlooks the town from a high crag was formerly the seat of the Dukes of Normandy and is shown above. The Treaty of Falaise was signed at the castle in December 1174 between the

captive William I, King of Scots, and the King of England Henry II Plantagenet. In modern times it is known for the battle of the *Falaise Pocket* during the Allied reconquest of France in August 1944 in which two German armies were encircled and destroyed by the Allied armies. Some 10,000 German troops were killed and 50,000 taken prisoner. Two-thirds of Falaise was destroyed by Allied bombing before the town was taken by a combined force of Canadian and Polish troops. Falaise was largely restored after the war.

Not surprisingly, today Falaise produces foodstuffs and household appliances. During your visit you may also find the Circuit des Remparts, Automates Avenue and the André Lemaitre museum as well as some nice restaurants.


A note for French film enthusiasts


